

The theme of this year's Fortnight will focus on the freedom to serve the poor and vulnerable in accord with human dignity and the Church's teaching. 

#### **Day 1:** NJ ► Washington DC ► Virginia

In the morning the bus tour will take you to the National Cathedral in Washington DC then we will proceed to Luray Cavern in Virginia. Afterwards you will enjoy and head to the hotel for the evening.

#### Day 2: Virginia ► Tennessee

In the morning after breakfast the bus tour will proceed to Tennessee and the Great Smoky Mountain National Park. The Greak Smoky Mountains are among the oldest mountains in the world, formed perhaps 200–300 million years ago with the elevation in the park ranging from 875 to 6,643 ft. You will also have an opportunity to ride on one of the biggest cablecar/train to the top of the mountain. In the evening we will enjoy the Dixie Stampede Dinner & Show.

#### Day 3: Tennessee

In the morning the bus tour will bring you to the Red Ruby Falls at Lookout Mountain which is one of the southeast favorite destinations. This massive waterfall, thundering over 300 gallons of water per minute, has been a family favorite for travelers for over 75 years. Afterwards you will proceed to Rock City Garden featuring massive ancient rock formations, gardens with over 400 native plant species, and breathtaking panoramic views. In the afternoon, the bus tour will go to the Lost Sea, which is America's largest underground lake. At the bottom of the cave you will board a glass-bottom boat for an exciting trip on the Lost Sea.

#### Day 4: Tennesse ► NJ

After breakfast, the bus tour will leave the hotel and travel back to Philadelphia, PA and see the Reading Terminal Market. Then we will proceed to Long Wood Gardens, which now encompasses 1,050 acres of Gardens, woodlands, and meadows. You will enjoy exquisite flowers, majestic trees, and opulent architecture with 20 indoor and 20 outdoor gardens, where you beauty of every turn. There are over 11,000 types of plants and more fountains than any other garden in the US. Afterwards, the bus will travel back to New Jersey.



## On Evangelization

By Pope Francis, Bishop of Rome

Extract from the Apostolic Exhortation Evangelii Gaudium

"Evangelization takes place in obedience to the missionary mandate of Jesus: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you" (Mt 28:19-20).

In these verses we see how the risen Christ sent his followers to preach the Gospel in every time and place, so that faith in him might spread to every corner of the earth.

The word of God constantly shows us how God challenges those who believe in him "to go forth".... The Church which "goes forth" is a community of missionary disciples who take the first step, who are involved and supportive, who bear fruit and rejoice. An evangelizing community knows that the Lord has taken the initiative, that he has loved us first (cf. 1 Jn 4:19), and therefore we can move forward, boldly take the initiative, go out to others, seek those who have fallen away, stand at the crossroads and welcome the outcast. Such a community has an endless desire to show mercy, the fruit of its own experience of the power of the Father's infinite mercy.

Let us try a little harder to take the first step and to become involved. Jesus washed the feet of his disciples. The Lord gets involved and he involves his own, as he kneels to wash their feet. He tells his disciples: "You will be blessed if you do this" (Jn 13:17). An evangelizing community gets involved by word and deed in people's daily lives; it bridges distances, it is willing to abase itself if necessary, and it embraces human life, touching the suffering flesh of Christ in others. Evangelizers thus take on the "smell of the sheep" and the sheep are willing to hear their voice. An evangelizing community is also supportive, standing by people at every step of the way, no matter how difficult or lengthy this may prove to be. It is familiar with patient expectation and apostolic endurance.

Evangelization consists mostly of patience and disregard for constraints of time. Faithful to the Lord's gift, it also bears fruit. An evangelizing community is always concerned with fruit, because the Lord wants her to be fruitful. It cares for the grain and does not grow impatient at the weeds. The sower, when he sees weeds sprouting among the grain does not grumble or overreact. He or she finds a way to let the word take flesh in a particular situation and bear fruits of

new life, however imperfect or incomplete these may appear. The disciple is ready to put his or her whole life on the line, even to accepting martyrdom, in bearing witness to Jesus Christ, yet the goal is not to make enemies but to see God's word accepted and its capacity for liberation



and renewal revealed. Finally an evangelizing community is filled with joy; it knows how to rejoice always. It celebrates every small victory, every step forward in the work of evangelization. Evangelization with joy becomes beauty in the liturgy, as part of our daily concern to spread goodness. The Church evangelizes and is herself evangelized through the beauty of the liturgy, which is both a celebration of the task of evangelization and the source of her renewed self-giving.(...) There are ecclesial structures which can hamper efforts at evangelization, yet even good

structures are only helpful when there is a life constantly driving, sustaining and assessing them. Without new life and an authentic evangelical spirit, without the Church's "fidelity to her own calling," any new structure will soon prove ineffective.

I dream of a "missionary option" — that is, a missionary impulse capable of transforming everything, so that the Church's customs, ways of doing things, times and schedules, language and structures can be suitably channeled for the evangelization of today's world rather than for her [own] self-preservation. The renewal of structures demanded by pastoral conversion can only be understood in this light: as part of an effort to make them more mission-oriented, to make ordinary pastoral activity on every level more inclusive and open, to inspire in pastoral workers a constant desire to go forth and in this way to elicit a positive response from all those whom Jesus summons to friendship with himself."

Safeguarding Children and Addressing Abuse

## The Archdiocese Has Long Recognized the Pain of Child Sexual Abuse

Since his arrival in 2001 and his participation in the drafting of the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, Archbishop Myers has on many occasions either individually or with bishops in the United States, with the Holy Father, and with clergy throughout the world, acknowledged publicly the pain that sexual offenders inside 🚆 the Church have inflicted on the innocent. At Chrism Masses before the entire presbyterate and parish representatives of the Archdiocese, in media

interviews, in statements is-

sued by the United States Con-

ference of Catholic Bishops,

and in essays and columns,

Archbishop Myers has stated

that "a Church which spends

the largest portion of its resources and the largest portion of its personnel in serving children, can never, and will never, condone anything which harms those children...We also



extend our apology and our assurance of support and help to those who have been harmed and who are seeking healing and support."

Beyond words, however, are actions. Assistance to victims, training and background checks of staff and volunteers, reporting accusations to civil authorities, removing clergy with substantiated accusations – these are clear indications that the Archbishop and the Archdiocese abhor child abuse.

What's more, 20 years ago, the Archdiocese was one of the first dioceses in the country to establish a formal Review Board of experts with legal, law enforcement, clinical and investigative background to examine allegations of abuse and recommend to the Archbishop action under Church law.
