In Celebration of Father's Day, flowers will be added to Saint Joseph's altar.



Protecting Religious Liberty

FORTNIGHT FREEDOM FREEDOM TO BEAR WITNESS

National and local Catholic charitable agencies around the country have long provided services to people in need, regardless of immigration status. However, several states passed laws that forbid what state legislatures consider "harboring" of undocumented immigrants—and what the Church considers Christian charity and pastoral care to those immigrants.

In Alabama, for example, the Catholic bishops, in cooperation with the Episcopal and Methodist bishops of Alabama, filed suit against a law prohibiting "harboring" of undocumented immigrants. Together, they explained that the "law makes illegal the exercise of our Christian religion which we, as citizens of Alabama, have a right to follow." They expressed concern that legally prohibited "harboring" (when there is knowledge or reckless disregard of the fact that persons are undocumented immigrants) would substantially burden their churches in their mission to serve undocumented immigrants in Alabama.

The law would have a chilling effect on their ministries—among other things, these church leaders feared that the prohibition on "harboring" would extend to activities like "encourag[ing immigrants] to attend Mass or giv[ing] them a ride to Mass;" "counsel[ing] them in times of difficulty or in preparation for marriage;" and inviting "them to come to Alcoholic Anonymous meetings or other recovery groups at our churches."

Other states have adopted similar laws that threaten the Church's ministry to undocumented immigrants. In March 2012, the U.S. Conference of

Catholic Bishops and several other Christian denominations filed an amicus brief with the U.S. Supreme Court in the case of Arizona v. United States. The brief discussed how the Arizona law and many state immigration laws like it threaten the Catholic mission to provide food, shelter, and other care to all. In June 2012, the U.S. Supreme Court issued its decision and found that several of the provisions of the Arizona law were pre-empted by federal immigration law, so these provisions were struck down.

Aside from Alabama and Arizona, Georgia, Oklahoma, South Carolina, and Utah have enacted laws that generally make criminal the "harboring" of undocumented immigrants.

Is our most cherished freedom truly under threat? Among many current challenges, these state immigration laws affect the religious liberty of the Church because they have criminalized certain acts of Christian charity and pastoral care. Religious liberty is more than freedom of worship; it includes our ability to make our contribution to the common good of all Americans without having to compromise our faith. Without religious liberty properly understood, all of us suffer, including those who seek a better life here in the United States.

Why Are You Terrified?

The disciples ask, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" They do reflect our concern when we ourselves are the victims of social injustice or when we perhaps see this injustice occurring in our communities.

Does Jesus care about us? Yes. Are we just to carry our cross in these moments and do nothing about our suffering? No. We are with Christ; He is with us, He loves us and all will be fine, yet He simply asks us, "Why are you terrified?"

Safeguarding Children & Addressing Abuse

The Archdiocese responds to all Allegations Quickly and Appropriately

In line with Archbishop Myers' personal directive and a Memorandum of Understanding with County Prosecutors, the Archdiocese reports all allegations of sexual abuse of minors to the local County Prosecutor, and cooperates with law enforcement investigations.

Those accused of abuse are temporarily removed from ministry or assignment while investigations are ongoing. If the allegation is substantiated, the removal is permanent.

Since his arrival in 2001, Archbishop Myers has removed permanently from ministry 19 priests against whom allegations were substantiated and who faced penalties under Church law. Only two Archdiocesan priests have been convicted or pleaded guilty to criminal charges involving minors during this same time, and both have resigned or been dismissed from the priesthood. No Archdiocesan priest has been charged with a crime involving minors since 2004.

Economic Inequality Inside-Out

Money is the taboo topic to discuss in America, except when it comes to issues such as income inequality. Many urge those with wealth to contribute to the world by voluntarily distributing their wealth, raising the minimum wage in their workplaces and providing maternity and paternity care for their workers, however, there is little talk about how all, including the poor, have a responsibility to the poor and to one another. All are called as the Church to work for the common good and to do so sacrificially. Everything that we own is not ours and you and I, no matter our economic income level, are called to give everything as Christ did. This does not imply a dramatic notion to literally sell all that one has, but rather to repurpose what we do have to benefit the world and others.

The common good, where all people have access to fulfillment, can be worked for, in terms of economic inequality, when you and I begin to see money as not something that we own but something that is lent to us. Pope Francis reminds us of a, social mortgage, which, holds that although it is lawful, as Saint Thomas Aquinas says, and indeed necessary 'that people have ownership of goods', insofar as their use is concerned, 'they possess them as not just their own, but common to others as well, in the sense that they can benefit others as well as themselves (12/8/13). The social mortgage transforms our image of possessions to see our debits as credits to the common good.

The social mortgage view is important to the life of a Catholic because human dignity is at stake in the realm of economic inequality, and that value is greater than those others that fall into this conversation. Pope Francis claims, *The dignity of the human person and the common good rank higher than the comfort of those who refuse to renounce their privileges.* When these values *are threatened, a prophetic voice must be raised* (11/24/13, no. 218). Human life, and their access to fulfillment in their fundamental relationships with God, others, themselves and the rest of creation, all surpass, in value, those things that the world considers valuable.

Catholicism urges you and I to view our goods as not our own and in the service of the common good and therefore we actually owe these goods to the good of others, in a particular sense. Some may begin to think like Saint John Chrysostom who declares, *Not to share one's goods with the poor is to rob them and to deprive them of life. It is not our goods that we possess, but theirs.* It is easy to allow this notion, as well as other notions in the Cospel to be taken quite literally, but calls to action like this and like those in the Gospel (see **LUKE 18:22**) are calls not to throw off one's riches like Saint Francis did but rather to view the purpose of our belongings as resources to serve.

Stewardship is then the key to understanding how to use the economic resources that you and I have in service rather than gain. Pope Francis invites you and I to, *ensure that humanity is served by wealth and not ruled by it* (1/17/14). He adds, *Money must serve, not rule! The Pope loves everyone, rich and poor alike, but he is obliged in the name of Christ to remind all that the rich must help, respect and promote the poor* (11/24/13, no. 58). You and I are to see money as a tool, not an end, and therefore it is not our duty to abandon those tools and literally, sell all that you

have (**LUKE 18:22**) but rather to view our bank accounts as instruments of justice and peace in the world.

The main thing that we are asked to *sell* or remove is our conception of money as our own, every last penny. In church, you and I may often hear the word *Stewardship* float around to remind us that we are responsible for the church for our *first hour* or for the 10% tithe, but stewardship is not only giving 10% it is giving 100%. Do not misunderstand; giving 100% does not mean throwing your wallet and your deed in the basket but rather to see these as instruments to make you an instrument to the service of God and others.

Even still, some criticize Pope Francis and the Church for claiming that Catholics and people ought to be good stewards, those who give 100%, not materially but purposefully. Some claim that the Pope should not talk about these issues because he is not an economist, nor should he talk about anything that he is not an expert in such as the environment, worker's rights, government relations and politics. Indeed Pope Francis, nor the majority of the Church, nor even Jesus Christ, Himself was an economist, a psychologist, a politician nor a scientist, but these figures do not claim to be promoting expertise within certain fields, rather they are calling us to live as Christ did: sacrificially, for the purpose to love God and others.

Giving sacrificially goes beyond money; stewardship applies to you entire life. The Pope claims, *Business is a vocation, and a noble vocation, provided that those engaged in it see themselves challenged by a greater meaning in life; this will enable them truly to serve the common good by striving to increase the goods of this world and to make them more accessible to all* (11/24/13, no. 203). You and I can live like Christ not by how much money is donated necessarily, but by how we purpose our lives to service, justice and peace.
