Baptisms take place on the 1st Sunday of every Month: 2 Baptisms per Mass at 10 AM & 12 Noon (English).

Because they will be promising to help raise your child in the practice of the Faith, the church requires that at least one of your child's godparents be a 'fully initiated Roman Catholic;' i.e., one who has been Baptized and received the sacraments of Holy Communion and Confirmation.

At the time of registering your child for Baptism, we ask that one of your chosen godparents provide a copy of their Confirmation certificate or some documentation from their church of Baptism or Confirmation indicating the month and year of their Confirmation. GODPARENTS & PARENTS are also required to attend a "baptism instruction" session on Saturday (the day before the Baptism) @ 4:00 PM in CHURCH (English & Spanish).

"HEY, IT'S GOD. DO HAVE TIME TO TALK?"

God is Calling. Should We Answer?

Do you have a friend who is horrible at answering calls or text messages? Perhaps he or she never responds or, at the best, will respond days later. While this person remains your friend, there are probably times you get frustrated and wonder, "Why do I even bother?" To be honest, I'm often one of these friends myself. There are times that I completely forget to respond to texts and phone calls from friends or family members People reach out, but for one reason or another, I don't always respond.

What if I told you we often reflect this same situation in our prayer lives? According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, prayer is "a covenant relationship between God and man in Christ. It is the action of God and man, springing forth from both the Holy Spirit and ourselves" (CCC 2564). Continuing, it says prayer is the "living relationship between each of us, as children of God, with God the Father, the Son (Jesus), and the Holy Spirit." This being the case, it concludes that prayer is by nature the "habit of being in the presence of the thrice-holy God and in communion with him" (CCC 2565). Essentially, through prayer, we have a conversation with and build our relationship with God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Prayer is therefore reciprocal communication and interaction between God and each one of us.

While prayer is reciprocal, it is always initiated by God, not by us. The *Catechism* says: "Man may forget his creator...yet the living and true God tirelessly calls each person to that mysterious encounter known as prayer. In prayer, the faithful God's initiative of love always comes first; our first step is always a response" (CCC 2567). Many of us probably think of prayer as something we initiate on our own, but, in reality, *all* prayer is a response to God's call. To return to the use the cell phone analogy from above, our spiritual cell phones are constantly receiving text messages and calls from God who's asking "Do you want to talk?" He is reaching out to us, we can choose to answer by praying or to ignore his call and move on with our lives.

However, unlike cell phone calls, there's no ringtone to tell us that God wants us to pray, so how do we know when to respond? While we may feel a strong urge to pray at certain times in our lives (a 'notification' in a certain sense), Saint Paul provides a more reliable answer in 1 THESSALONIANS 5:16-18. He writes, "Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will for God for you in Jesus Christ." In this passage, Paul asserts that we should pray without ceasing. This means that God is *always* inviting calling us have a conversation with him and inviting us to respond through prayer. Sounds daunting, right?

But if this seems unmanageable, perhaps the problem lies with a flawed notion of prayer, not with




Paul's prescription. I think we often have the tendency to limit prayer to words and equate it only with speaking to God. From this perspective, praying without ceasing would be nearly impossible. However, the *Catechism* says that prayer is "being in the presence of the thrice-holy God." God is not limited by time or space. He is present everywhere and at all times. Therefore, we are *always* in God's presence. As long as we consciously acknowledge this fact, we are praying. Earlier, I said prayer was a conversation with God. While we can and should speak to God, when we pray by being in God's presence, we are listening to him and inviting him to speak to us.

To put it another way, perhaps you've experienced an occasion where you've "communicated" with friends or loved ones just by sitting with them in silence. At times like these words aren't necessary; there is value in just being in their presence. This same thing can be said about our relationship with God. Even when we're not speaking and God doesn't seem to speak to us, being in his presence can still be a form of prayer.

To summarize, all prayer, whether we talking to God or just acknowledging his presence, is a response to his invitation. He is always calling us to communicate with him but he cannot force us to respond. In my own life, I can be as bad at answering God's call to prayer as I am at responding to text messages from my family or friends. Though I know he's calling, I choose to ignore him either because I'm busy or because there are other things I want to do. If you've found yourself in a similar situation, the good news is that God isn't like us. While we may get frustrated and eventually give up on trying to contact friends who don't respond to our calls or texts, God will nevertire of inviting to pray.

However, just as a lack of communication erodes human relationships, neglecting our prayer life can eventually cause our relationship with God to decay. What can we do to change this and work toward praying "without ceasing?" For starters, if we've neglected our prayer life in the past, we can look back to find out what caused us to do so. Perhaps our conception of prayer is too limited. Maybe we've put other things in our lives before prayer and our relationship with God. There's also the possibility that our schedules are too full and that we've left little to no space for prayer. Regardless of the reasons, once we know what prevents us from answering God's invitation, we can make adjustments to improve our prayer life. Next, we can schedule specific times for prayer into our day (in the morning, during a commute, before going to bed, etc). By getting into the practice of praying at specific times each day, we will gradually become better at responding to God's invitation to communicate. Finally, we can acclimate ourselves to recognizing God's presence in our lives, no matter where we are or what we're doing. Throughout the day, even while working, we can pause for a few seconds to reflect on the fact that we are in God's presence and listen to him. By doing these things, we can begin to develop a healthier prayer life and a stronger relationship with God.

One final note, when I am feeling distracted and or find it difficult to pray, I turn to the Jesus prayer: *Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner*. This prayer, originally from the Eastern Christian tradition, summarizes the Gospel. When, repeated (simi-



lar to the Hail Mary's when saying the rosary) it serves as a way to center ourselves, acknowledge God's presence in our lives, and bring us into communion with Jesus Christ.

Today's Gospel

This Sunday we read from the Gospel of Luke, continuing immediately from last week's Gospel. Recall that in last Sunday's Gospel, Jesus read from the prophet Isaiah and announced that this Scripture was now fulfilled. In today's Gospel, we learn that the people of Nazareth are impressed by Jesus' words, and yet they seem surprised. They still think of Jesus as merely Joseph's son. They do not expect such words from someone they believe that they know. This Gospel is about who Jesus is and who people believe him to be. The story of Jesus' preaching and rejection at Nazareth is found in each of the Synoptic Gospels. In Luke's Gospel, this incident is told in a way that foretells Jesus' passion and death and helps explain the inclusion of the Gentiles in the promise of salvation. In Luke's Gospel this incident appears at the beginning of Jesus' ministry; in Matthew and Mark, this event is placed considerably later, after Jesus has preached and taught elsewhere. Only Luke identifies the content of Jesus' teaching in any detail, telling us that Jesus read from the book of the prophet Isaiah in the synagogue. In Mark and Matthew's Gospels, Jesus teaches in the synagogue in Nazareth, and the townspeople take offense because Jesus is only the son of a carpenter. They reject his authority to teach them. In Matthew and Mark, it is only after Jesus is rejected that he observes times when Israel has rejected prophets.

In Luke's Gospel, the people are surprised but not immediately offended by Jesus' words in the synagogue. It is the words that follow his reading from the prophet Isaiah that seem to offend them. Jesus challenges and provokes the people of Nazareth by referring to examples in which Israel rejected the prophets. He also challenges them to respond to his message, the message of a prophet, in a way that is different from their ancestors. This call for a new response leads to his rejection. It is helpful to consider the historical context of Luke's Gospel. Luke has witnessed the acceptance of the gospel message among many Gentiles. He endeavors to explain why the Good News of Jesus has not been as well-received by his Jewish contemporaries. Luke's report interprets the cause of Jesus' rejection at Nazareth in the context of this later Christian history. Just as the people at Nazareth did not welcome the Good News that Jesus announced, so too many among the people of Israel will not accept the preaching of the gospel.

After Jesus' words of challenge. Luke reports that there was a movement to kill Jesus by throwing him over a cliff. This differs from the reports found in Mark and Matthew's Gospels, where Jesus is said to be unable to perform miracles in Nazareth because of the people's lack of faith. Luke says that Jesus walks away from the crowd that intended to kill him; it is not yet his time. The animosity of the people of Nazareth prefigures and prepares the reader of Luke's Gospel for the cross. Luke wants all to understand that it is through his death on the cross that Jesus offers God's salvation to all.
