SAFEGUARDING CHILDREN AND ADDRESSING ABUSE:

The Archdiocese Has Long Recognized the Pain of Child Sexual Abuse

Since his arrival in 2001 and his participation in the drafting of the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, Archbishop Myers has on many occasions either individually or with bishops in the United States, with the Holy Father, and with clergy throughout the world, acknowledged publicly the pain that sexual offenders inside the Church have inflicted on the innocent

At Chrism Masses before the entire presbyterate and parish representatives of the Archdiocese, in media interviews, in statements issued by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, and in essays and columns, Archbishop Myers has stated that "a Church which spends the largest portion of its resources and the largest portion of its personnel in serving children, can never, and will never, condone anything which harms those children...

We also extend our apology and our assurance of support and help to those who have been harmed and who are seeking healing and support." Beyond words, however, are actions. Assistance to victims, training and background checks of staff and volunteers, reporting accusations to civil authorities, removing clergy with substantiated accusations - these are clear indications that the Archbishop and the Archdiocese abhor child abuse. What's more, 20 years ago, the Archdiocese was one of the first dioceses in the country to establish a formal Review Board of experts with legal, law enforcement, clinical and investigative background to examine allegations of abuse and recommend to the Archbishop action under Church law.

SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Jesus promises his disciples that the Father will send the Advocate, the Holy Spirit

This portion of John's Gospel comes near the end of the first of four chapters that make up Jesus' long farewell discourse at the Last Supper. This section of chapter 14 actually sums up the themes of the opening of the discourse: the Christian's life is not shaped by Jesus' absence but by God's abiding presence; God's presence overcomes anxiety about God's absence; and the present holds in it the seeds of a fresh future shaped by love, not fear.

These verses also contain a glimpse of some of the other themes of the farewell discourse: Jesus' relationship with the Father and the disciples' relationship to Jesus connect the disciples to the Father as well. Jesus promises to send an Advocate or intercessor who will remind the disciples of everything that Je-



sus taught them and bring them peace. Jesus is preparing his disciples in advance for his absence so that they will continue to believe in him and not feel all alone after his return to the Father. After the initial excitement of his Easter appearances, Jesus will remain with his followers in a very different

way throughout the centuries. As our celebration of the Easter season is coming to an end, the liturgy reminds us that Jesus remains with us through the Holy Spirit, who teaches us everything we need to know, reminds us of all that Jesus taught, and brings us peace.

CALLED TO MERCY

The Challenge of Prison Outreach

More than 2 million prisoners are being held in U.S. prisons. Among these are baptized Christians and Catholics, yet Catholics may feel that prison ministry has no place in parish ministry. Nevertheless, the call for this work of mercy is clear in Matthew 25:31-46: "when the Son of Man comes in his glory... he will say to those on his right, "Come you blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you... for I was in prison and you visited me." Then the righteous will answer him, saying, "Lord when did we see you... in prison, and visit you?" He will answer and say to them, "Amen, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of these least ones, you did it to me."

Why Prison Ministry?

The answer is — the Gospel of Christ and our witness tot he redeeming power of God's mercy and love.

Our Call to mercy

Only a small number of Catholics seem inclined towards ministry to prisoners despite the fact that prisons are found in almost every community. Prison ministry does not necessarily mean a call to actually go into a prison. Not everyone feels called or is capable of visiting a prison. Yet every Catholic can participate in some way. The purpose here is to sugest ways to engage in such an outreach.

Praying for Prisoners

One of the simplest ways to help is through prayer. Include prisoners in the Prayer of the Faithful and form a prayer group to pray for prisoners. Dismas Ministry has a Union of Prayer created just for this purpose. Visit "Get Involved" at dismasministry.org

Corresponding with prisoners

Another simple way to get involved is through correspondence. With the help of the chaplain, parish members "adopt" a

prisoner by writing occasional letters and greeting cards. Participants should not share their own addresses. a Post Office box can be arranged through which all mail passes.

Praying and studying with prisoners

Worship services and Bible study must be arranged through the prison chaplain or administrator. Training and authorization may be required, and usually provided by the prison. If a Catholic person or parish is involved already they can serve as mentors for beginners.

Visiting prisoners

Some parish members may wish to visit prisoners inside the correctional facility. Such facilities are listed with the county and the state's Department of Corrections. They could commit to being a visitor for at least one year. The chaplain can advise them about the policies of the correctional facility. It is very important to know the rules of the prison regarding visitors. Dismas Ministry offers a prison ministry training resource called "Messengers of Hope" with companion DVD of Catholics speaking about their involvement in prison ministry. Helping Released Prisoners

Eventually, 90% of prisoners will be released to their communities. However, they face impossible odds because they are released with no job. only a few dollars for food, shelter and transportation, and often with no family or friends to rely on. Parishes can create a welcoming pamphlet that guides them to job training and other assistance. It should list phone numbers and addresses of agencies and programs available for this purpose. In some cases, a parish team works with the local parole office. They take on returning persons and assist them with their needs. Such relationships usually lasts six months to a year.

Assisting Families of Prisoners

For some prisoner's families loss of income means food, clothing and shelter become critical.

Many times, they can't afford to make visiting trips, or they travel long hours by bus, only to be turned away if the prisoner has been transferred or not allowed to have visitors. Families often feel they have "a sentence of their own" even though they did not commit the crime. They feel shunned by friends, family, neighbors and even their church. Shame and fear of rejection often keep them from revealing themselves. Local Catholic Charities or Social Services, or the St. Vincent de Paul Society may know who they are.

How to help your parish

From time to time people ask what are the best ways to help our parish. It's a great inquiry but, a difficult one to respond to because helping a parish really means having a desire to become a better disciple of Jesus. And then, after one has committed him/ herself to that lifelong process of becoming a better disciple, what required is good modeling of the faith, and working to bring others to the Lord. So you see, the best way to help a parish is really not about a "checklist" but more importantly about entering the journey and inviting others to do the same. There are, however, some other practical ideas that I offer here below for consideration, reflection and action:

Register with our parish and then be faithful to attend and participate — Committing yourself to the church means letting us know that we can count on you. Obviously you can't be of much help if you don't show up or take part. Some people underestimate their value of simply being present. Joining together with others adds to their encouragement, and it encourages the leaders and the parish team who have prayed and prepared all week to minister to you. It helps all of us for you to come faithfully and on time. And don't merely sit there like a bump on a log. Be friendly, put a smile on your face, introduce yourself to others around you and enter with an openness to singing and worshiping.

Commit yourself personally to love the Lord and others — Scriptures tell us that all the desires of God are condensed into only two cardinal commandments that Jesus gave to His followers: You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and love your neighbor as yourself. While not always an easy task, modeling these two commandments every day helps the church to reinforce this objective for every believer, and we also help to eliminate the elements of conflict and division which can hinder our unity.

Pray for our parish church, the pastor and staff — St Paul explained that it is the duty of Christians to pray for all who are in authority, especially those in spiritual authority. You can be a tremendous help by praying fervently for our church, and especially for those who work to lead it.

Get to know our parish staff and cooperate with them — The more you get to know our team, the more you will likely come to trust the leadership. The old saying, "there are no strangers here only friends who have not met" is a good measure for this point. Show respect and cooperate with those who exercise legitimate authority. Belligerence or antagonism toward parish leadership may be acceptable in secular society, but there is no place for it in the Lord's church—or our parish!.

Do your part to help shoulder the load of responsibility — Pastors and parish staffs often feel much like Moses did when Israel fought with Amelek. Their arms become weary under the weight of so many responsibilities and we need brothers and sisters to stand beside us and help distribute the load. The Lord never intended for the whole ministry of the church to be carried solely by the pastor or a mere handful of people. It's said that 80% of the

work is done by 20% of the people, and sadly, this has caused the "burnout" of its many outstanding workers. If everyone would simply pitch in and do their fair share in helping, serving, and giving, all the needs would be met and no one would be overburdened. Be willing to volunteer with whatever needs done and don't be finicky about what you will or will not do. And don't help out just for strokes of attention, but do it for God's

Apply the teaching of scriptures, tradition and ministry to your life — There's not much that a pastor loves more than to see the community practicing what has been preached, living a Godly, holy life. Learn to appreciate the spiritual values offered in homilies and spiritual readings. It helps our church when we all live and conduct ourselves in a Christ-like manner. Whether we realize it or not, each of us is a walking billboard for our church. Whatever the people of our community see in our life, they will tend to identify with our parish. Behave and speak well of the church and our parish. Eyes and ears are always open to the things we say and do.

Seek out and use your gifts — According to the scriptures, the Lord distributes gifts to each in the body as it pleases Him. Spiritual gifts are not provided to us merely for our own gratification, but so the church would be edified or built up. God has given us gifts that will be a help to our church -- it is up to each of us to discover them, develop and utilize them under the direction and cooperation with our spiritual leaders.

Contribute to solutions and not to problems — Every pastor would be thrilled if each of the members got involved and helped the church in some way. However, we would also rejoice if certain ones simply stopped being a pain in the neck! It's a shame that sometimes our staff spends so much time "putting out fires," that is, squelching problems that could have a negative influence on the whole body, such as gossip, rumors, complaining, misunderstandings, hurt feelings, discontent and so forth. Regrettably, it has been said that 90% of these kinds of problems are generated among the same 10% of the people.

Spiritually mature persons who wish to help the church don't become a part of such problems — instead, they contribute to solutions. They avoid divisive people and don't get caught up in the mischief or grievances of others. If they are aware of spreading problems in the community, they will try to bring a resolution, or else they bring matters to the attention of staff so that we can bring an end to it. People who wish to be an asset to our church don't participate with or spread problems -- they help resolve
