The Archdiocese Reports all Allegations of Abuse

The Archdiocese of Newark takes very seriously any and all complaints of sexual misconduct by members of the clergy, Religious and lay staff of the Archdiocese. We encourage anyone with knowledge of an act of sexual misconduct to inform the Archdiocese immediately so that we may take appropriate action and provide support to the victim.

Although the Archdiocese immediately reports all abuse allegations to the appropriate County Prosecutor, it also encourages victims to independently report such matters to the Prosecutor.

Individuals who want to report an allegation of sexual misconduct to the Archdiocese may do so by calling the Victim's Assistance Coordinator of the Archdiocesan Office of Child and Youth Protection at (201) 407-3256.


Sacrament of Matrimony

Coming Home



In chapter 15 of Luke's Gospel, Jesus tells three parables about losing, finding, and rejoicing. The outcasts of society, the taxpayers, and the sinners approach Jesus eager to hear what he has to say. In Luke's Gospel, hearing is a sign of conversion. The Pharisees and scribes, still suspicious of Jesus, complain about him associating with sinners. So he tells them these three parables.

In the first story, the parable of The Lost Sheep, the shepherd leaves behind the 99 sheep to search for the 1 lost sheep. When he finds it, the shepherd rejoices not alone as in Matthew's version, but with friends and neighbors. In the same way, God rejoices more over 1 sinner who repents—like the outcasts who have come to hear Jesus—than over the 99 righteous like the Pharisees and scribes.

The second story, about a poor woman who will not stop searching until she finds her lost coin, makes the same point. Why are the Pharisees complaining? They should rejoice when the lost are found.

Finally we come to what is probably the most memorable parable in the Gospels, the story we know as The Prodigal Son. Just as in The Lost Sheep and The Lost Coin, this story (found only in Luke) is really about the seeker. The loving father is at the center of this parable. Even though his son runs off with

his father's inheritance and squanders the money, the father waits for him, hoping for his return. Upon his son's return, the father, "full of compassion," runs out to embrace and for give him before the son can utter one word of repentance. At this point the rejoicing begins.

The parable does not end there. Rather, it makes one more point about the older son's reaction. This son who never left, just like the Pharisees and scribes who feel they are righteous, refuses to enter his father's house to join in the rejoicing. He has served his father. He has obeyed him. Perhaps it was not out of love. The father's response teaches us that God's care and compassion extend to the righteous and sinner alike. When we are lost, God doesn't wait for our return. He actively seeks us out. And when the lost are found, how could we not celebrate and rejoice?

"How often do we need to be reminded of God's unchanging love and ready forgiveness, lest we lose heart when we ourselves or our dear ones go astray! The parable speaks not only of the prodigal son, but also of his older brother, who must also learn to accept the father's mercy, which transcends both reward and punishment.

By calling for a feast of thanksgiving, the father is really asking each son to share his joy by recognizing the other as a brother. The parable ends without our knowing how the older brother responds to this invitation. Jesus in effect is challenging each of us to think about how we respond to God's invitation, to open our hearts to his reconciling love and to become "merciful like the Father".





The Beginner's Introduction to Mass

Attending Catholic Mass for the first time can be rather confusing and foreign for the non-Catholic In looking around the internet for a good introduction to the Mass to show my non-Catholic friends and family, most of the ones I find seem to be too in depth and complicated for one who has never been to Mass to really understand. So I decided to write an simple introduction to the Mass for the first-time attendee. I do not intend to go into details, or even go through every single thing that happens at Mass. Instead, I am simply going to go through the basic format of the Sunday Mass. Hopefully it will give the non-Catholic enough information to be at ease and not feel out of place while attending.

One of the first things that one will notice in attending Mass are the different body postures that Catholics take. Catholics stand, sit, and kneel. Each of these postures have meaning:

- Standing at Mass is a sign of showing reverence and honor to God. One of the main places where we stand is during prayers to God.
- Sitting during Scripture readings and the homily is a posture that shows that we are to be attentive to what is being said to
- And finally, kneeling is a sign of humbleness and submission before God. Catholics kneel during the Eucharistic Prayer, which is when the bread and wine become the Real Presence of Christ (more on that later).

Now, on to the actual Mass. Mass is divided into two main parts, which are the Liturgy of Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Let's discuss the Liturgy of the Word.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

Mass begins with the opening procession, a time of remembering where



we have sinned, and we ask God for His mercy. After this there are four Scripture readings. One reading from the Old Testament, one from the Psalms (which is usually sung), one from a New Testament letter, and finally a reading from one of the four Gospels. After this, the priest (or sometimes a deacon) will expound upon the readings in a homily, and show us how we can apply them to our lives. When the homily is over we pray the Nicene Creed, offer prayers to God as a community, and collect an offering.

If this sounds too complicated, let me put it in more simple terms. During the Liturgy of the Word, Catholics hear the Word of God proclaimed, and we respond to that Word by professing our faith, praying for others, and giving to others. To make it even simpler: We hear! We respond!

LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

The second part of Mass is called the Liturgy of the Eucharist, and it begins when members of the congregation (who represent all who are present) bring to the priest the bread and wine that will be used for Communion. There is a prayer of thanksgiving for what God has provided, followed by the Eucharistic Prayer (one will recognize when this starts because everyone will kneel). It is during the Eucharistic Prayer that Catholics believe that the bread and wine become the actual Body and Blood of Christ. After the Eucharistic Prayer we pray the Lord's Prayer together and exchange a sign of peace (which is usually a handshake in our culture) that reminds us to make peace with our brothers and sisters before we approach Communion.

After the sign of peace is Communion, which is when Catholics go forward to receive the Body and Blood of

Christ. One important thing needs to be mentioned here is that the Catholic Church practices what is called closed communion, which means that only Catholics who are in full communion with the Catholic Church should receive Communion. This is because Catholics see the sharing of the Eucharist as a sign of the unity of faith. After Communion is the closing hymn and procession, and it is over.

To sum up Mass in a nutshell, in the Liturgy of the Word Jesus feeds us with His Word, and we respond in faith and action. And in the Liturgy of the Eucharist Jesus feeds us with Himself, and we then go forth into the world, nourished with Christ and His Word, to share the Gospel with others

As I wrote in the beginning, my intent isn't to go into all of the details of the Mass, or even explain every single thing that happens at Mass. In fact, even after reading this, I'm sure that the non-Catholic would still have a lot of questions after attending Mass for the first time, and that is great! But hopefully I have given enough information that the first time attendee will not feel confused about what is going on around them. Hope to see you at Mass Sunday!

Jesus' gesture at the Last Supper is the ultimate thanksgiving to the Father for His love, for His mercy. "Thanksgiving" in Greek is expressed as "eucharist." And that is why the Sacrament is called the Eucharist: it is the supreme thanksgiving to the Father, who so loved us that He gave us His Son out of love. This is why the term Eucharist includes the whole of that act, which is the act of God and man together, the act of Jesus Christ, true God and true Man.

Why Are We Gathered Today?

To fully live out your Christianity you have to do it within a community and doing this requires that you join together with the community in Worship!



Why do we have to go to church? We must begin by having the mindset that Christianity is not a "personal" religion. By that I mean we cannot live a full Christian life on our own. Christianity is always about us in relation to the community. From the moment Jesus begins his public ministry he is calling people into community. When he meets Andrew on the seashore he doesn't just form a personal relationship with him. Andrew goes and brings his brother Simon (later called Peter) into this circle. Then Jesus calls James and his brother John and they become a part of this group. You see my point? At the very beginning a community is formed with Jesus at the center. First the 12 apostles then the group widens to include numberless disciples, then crowds, etc. Not only did these people form a relationship with Jesus but they formed a bond with each other.

At the Ascension, Jesus gives the great commission; Go into the world and make disciples of all nations. Basically Jesus is telling them to go out to the world and bring more people into this community.

Paul gives us the best example of forming community during his various travels. He travels across the Mediterranean to cities like Ephesus, Corinth, Galatia, Thessalonica, and Rome. When he preaches in these various places he forms communities among the people. These communities we would call "churches". In the many letters of Paul we read how these communities should live out their Christianity. He instructs them about their responsibilities toward each other and the faith they have accepted.

So, what does that have to do with why I have to go to church? Because to fully live out your Christianity you have to do it within a community and doing this requires that you join together with the community in Worship!


When you attend mass with the other members of the parish the worship is enhanced by your presence. At the same time your worship experience is enhanced by the presence of others. Could you image if on one Sunday everyone woke up and said, I don't feel like going to church today.

The place would be empty and the people who did come to church would be bummed out because let's face it, an empty church makes for an empty worship experience. There is nothing more exciting than a full church with everyone praying and singing together. That is a real experience of God in our lives.

I like to say at the beginning of mass that we join together to not only pray with each other but we pray for each other. When you are up, someone else may be down and your prayers can lift that person out of their troubles. The same is true when you feel troubled by something in your life. By coming to mass and being with the community at prayer we can be lifted up out of our own troubles and our burdens can be lightened! This is something that can't happen if you distance yourself from the community and only have a personal relationship with God.

So, why do I have to go to mass? Because this is how we Christians fully experience the presence of Jesus in our lives.


